

Historical Summary

Amalek came and fought with Israel in Rephidim. This was the first enemy to rise up against Israel in the wilderness. Moses sent Joshua out to lead the fighting forces while he observed from the hill. When Moses lifted up his hands Israel prevailed and when he lowered his hands Amalek prevailed. Aaron and Hur supported his raised arms as fatigue set in, and as a result Israel triumphed over Amalek.
